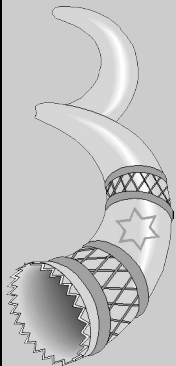

Rabbi's Message

What is in a name?

There are many ways we can reference the date or season of the year. Most of the world just marked new calendar year of 2012 (Happy New Year!). As Jews we recently celebrated Chanukkah and are now in the month of Tevet. But we also reference the calendar by our place in the weekly reading of the Torah and by that measure we just concluded the book of *Breishit* (Genesis) and are beginning the book of *Shmot* (Exodus).

The word *Shmot* literally means 'names' and is the name of the entire book because the text begins "And these are the names of the children of Israel (Jacob) who came into Egypt with Jacob; each man came with his household". The question has been asked why the Torah needs to mention these names since we had been told them previously (and repeatedly) in the previous book of *Breishit*. I am grateful to Rabbi David Willig, a colleague of mine who lives in Tzfat, from whose dvar Torah on the subject I was inspired and will now embellish.

In Genesis, there was not a 'Jewish People'. There was only the family of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob - 70 in number - and we knew them each by name! But the book concludes with the family multiplying greatly in Egypt so that by the beginning of Exodus there are hundreds of thousands of Jews in Egypt. At that point it is easy to just become impersonal numbers. But the 2nd Book of the Torah is called *Shmot* - 'names'. A name brings with it responsibility and reputation - either pride or shame. As Jews we are called upon to be present and accountable - *Hineni* - as a people and as individuals. We can not hide among the masses and claim no responsibility. Note that Pharaoh is not given a name but only a title. He thought he could get away with whatever he wanted under the cloak of a crown. In fact we read about several Pharaohs - each with the same title and no name.

On the other hand, when Pharaoh instructs the midwives to kill the baby boys, the midwives are mentioned by name - Shifra and Puah (AKA Yocheved and Miriam). They take responsibility for their behavior and refuse to be the nameless soldiers of a nameless Pharaoh.

We must not become a nameless people or nameless Jews or just another congregation. We must acknowledge the heritage we are blessed to represent and the accountability we must each face. And that comes with owning our name and working diligently to uphold our reputation - a reputation so valuable that the Bible states in Ecclesiastes 7:1 "A good name is better than fine oil". But it is not just a good thing, it is a divine thing. Remember that one of the 10 commandments is not to take G-d's name in vain. Therefore we address G-d by name only during prayer and serious study. All other times we refer to G-d as *HaShem* = *the name*.

As we read the book of *Shmot* during the coming weeks, may we each be blessed to recall our name and our heritage and may we proudly (but not pridefully) perpetuate the values and customs our ancestors as taught and give by *HaShem* - the greatest *Name* of all.

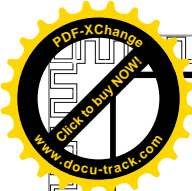

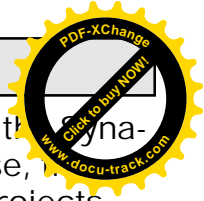

Mitzvah of the Month 5772

Level 1 Dec 27th – Jan 24th) *Kashrut* כשרות

Kashrut (the noun associating with ‘keeping kosher’) is one of the fundamental pillars of Jewish life. On the surface, it is a description of the dietary laws. We are familiar with many of them and I have included the highlights below.

But for all we think we know about *kashrut*, most Jews misunderstand it. *Kashrut* uses the language of food because eating is something we do very regularly, but it is only partially about food. Much more so, *kashrut* is a daily opportunity to reaffirm the core values which define our entire lives. Every time we place something in our mouths – which let’s face it is pretty often – *kashrut* allows us to make a statement about:

Ethical commitment to every living creature.

As Jews, we value all life. We never kill anything indiscriminately, and even when we are hungry we consider the proper treatment of another living being against our desire or need for food. We say ‘no’ to certain animals because they are scavengers or animals which attack others. We do not use our hunger as an excuse to inflict more pain than is absolutely necessary – whether we kill the animal ourselves or benefit from someone else doing it on our behalf. We respect that while *meat* is food for sustenance, *blood* represents the spiritual essence of any animal and that belongs only to G-d. And finally, we never ever blur the distinction between meat (a permissible form of killing) and milk (a life-giving liquid provided by a mother to her child).

Engaging in an active living (romantic?) relationship with G-d.

Relationships require communication and action. We listen and respond to the ones we love not because we agree with (or even like) everything they ask, but because we value closeness with them. Flowers, jewelry, cards, cookies, wedding rings... are neither ethical nor unethical. They are simply a way to say we care deeply. But what do you give the One who has everything (in this case, G-d)? I maintain that in addition to being the proper way to treat animals, *kashrut* is an opportunity to show G-d on a daily basis that we want closeness with Him. G-d has provided us with the dietary laws much as a person provides a wish list before a birthday or anniversary of what will make them happy. One does not ethically have to give anything. But a relationship with giving is exponentially different from a relationship without giving. The question in our heart should be “what do I want more – this particular food item or a closer relationship because I listened to G-d?” It is not always easy, but the best things rarely are.

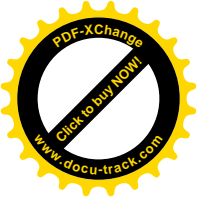
Developing healthy discipline and habits which will impact how we act at all times.

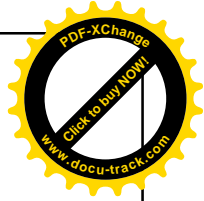
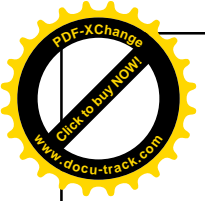
Is karate about exercise? Is scouting about building a campfire or selling cookies? They are both about developing character. The same is true with *kashrut*. What we eat matters (see above), but how we act in between meals matters just as much. *Kashrut* is a discipline which refines us ethically and spiritually so that we can be ready to make appropriate decisions in dealings with whomever we meet. *Kashrut* requires us to saying ‘no’ to things we should not eat – even when we like it and even when others are eating it and even when we are hungry. And in doing so, *kashrut* can also prepare us to act appropriately in other life situations – to deal honestly in business even though there are real temptations; to refrain from anger or gossip or making a comment or joke which will be hurtful; to remain faithful to our spouse even though other attractions may be real. There are few things if any in this world more important than consistent ethical behavior. But it is not easy. Look at how many people of all backgrounds fall short. Doing the right thing takes practice, patience and perseverance. Observance of *kashrut* at eating time can instill within us the discipline we need to be a mensch all the time.

I invite every Jew in our community to use this month to consider some of these ideas and how each of us can improve our lives. It is not all or nothing. Being more conscientious in some area of *kashrut* is a good start. May being willing to say ‘NO’ to certain foods open us to a world of more ‘YES’ in our relationship to G-d and to all life – at meal times and always.

A Quick Review of Some Kosher Rules.

- All fruits and vegetables are kosher (perhaps the ideal is vegetarianism?). One need still be mindful, though, of added ingredients or of equipment used for processing which may not be kosher.
- Only animals which are *tahor* (meet certain specifications) may be considered for eating
 - ◊ Land animals that have a split, cloven hoof and chew their cud (cows, sheep, deer ok; pigs, dogs, horses not ok)
 - ◊ birds as listed in the Torah and rabbinic tradition (chicken, duck ok; ostrich, eagle, crow not ok)
 - ◊ fish with fins and scales (salmon, tuna ok; shellfish, octopus not ok)
- Even animals which are *tahor* must be slaughtered in the correct manner (called *schita*). This entails a smooth cut to the neck with an extremely sharp knife in order to sever both the blood and oxygen supply, thus killing the animal as quickly and painlessly as possible. An animal killed in any other manner (shot with gun or arrow, hammer-blow, electrocution...) is considered to be *treif* (literally ‘torn’) and is not permissible. Thus the difference between kosher hamburger (slaughtered and prepared properly) and non-kosher hamburger.
- After the permissible type of animal is slaughtered in the proper way, there are still several requirements before the meat is declared kosher:
 - ◊ Inspection of the animal to determine it was not seriously injured or diseased before it was slaughtered.
 - ◊ Removal of a few various portions of the animal which are always prohibited (certain fats as well as the sciatic nerve which Jacob strained when wrestling with an angel in chapter 32 of Genesis)
 - ◊ Complete removal of all blood through a system of soaking, salting and rinsing the meat)
- Meat products and milk products may not be eaten at the same meal.
